

“When it is cold, I wear a pull-over and a coat to stay warm.”


“When it rains, I wear a raincoat to stay dry.”

MARSEILLE, CITY OF HOSPITALITY



From its very beginnings, Marseille and its Old Port have always been a place of passage, of arrival and departure for many travellers.



Above is a view of the “Vieux Port” (the Old Port)

You can see the “Notre Dame de la Garde” Basilica on the hill, on the rightside. It overlooks the city of Marseille. The inhabitants of Marseille also call it “La Bonne Mère” (the Good Mother).



The town hall is located alongshore of the Old Port.

The motto of the French Republic “Freedom, equality, brotherhood” is a reminder that Marseille welcomes all people and guarantees their protection and freedom.

MARSEILLE, INTERNATIONAL CITY

Keep an eye while walking around, you will see and hear other languages than French.


Part 4: Discover the city




In Marseille, I have lived in the villa called “Les mille roses”, near the terminus of the metro line 1 “La Fourragère”.

HOW TO GET AROUND MARSEILLE?

Marseille is composed of 16 districts!

The bouillabaisse



In Marseille, the bouillabaisse is a typical dish.



The bouillabaisse

The bouillabaisse is a fish dish. In the past, it used to be called the “soup of the poor” because it was made with the rockfish that could not be sold. It stayed at the bottom of the fishermen’s bags after returning from fishing in rocky inlets, between Marseille and Toulon.

WHAT SPORT TO PRACTICE?

The two favorite types of sport of the people living in Marseille are soccer and boules.



The inhabitants of Marseille are fans of the football team “Olympique de Marseille” (OM). The **OM** often plays in the **Velodrome stadium**.

There are gymnasiums, stadiums and swimming pools everywhere in Marseille.

In Marseille, sport activities are practised in:

- 131 gymnasiums;
- 14 swimming pools;
- 65 stadiums (85 large playground areas);
- 90 tennis courts;
- 225 bowling grounds;
- 251 sports facilities;
- and the Orange Vélodrome stadium where the Olympique de Marseille (OM) plays.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

You will find public libraries, theatres, movie theatres, social centres “*Maisons pour tous*“ for learning and entertainment...



Alcazar is the biggest public library in Marseille (in the 1st district)



DIVERSITY OF CIVILISATIONS

The public can see different aspects of the Mediterranean region and its permanent relationships with Europe.


